FROM THE MANSE

Dear Friends,

During my holiday in August I spent a few days on the island of Arran. I have visited the island on many occasions and I never fail to marvel at its beauty and the friendliness of the people.

On this particular visit, I crossed over to Holy Island which is a short sail from Lamlash. The sun shone, the sky was blue and the sense of peace and calm was amazing. As I walked on the island I spent some time thinking, some time reflecting and a lot of time praying! It was a great day and one I will remember for a long time.

Recently a number of ministers and elders within the Presbytery of Stirling met together to think about the challenges facing the Church of Scotland in these days. Some statistics were shared with us, which I, in turn share with you:

In 1995 the membership of the Church of Scotland was 700,000. By 2015 it had dropped to 363,000 and in the same period the number of ministers declined by 34%.

Today 76% of ministers are over the age of 60 and 50% of ministers are due to retire in the next five years.

Within the Presbytery of Stirling there has in the period 2000-2016 been a 38% reduction in the number of members.

The number of vacant charges is increasing and vacancies are lasting longer, some up to five years and more.

These statistics are in some sense alarming and a very real cause for concern. Inevitably, changes will have to come but before they do it is my firm opinion that we should not rush and come up with a short term solution to what are fundamental and long term challenges. Instead, we should listen to what proposals come to us from the Presbytery and the General

Assembly and then we should take time to think, reflect and pray, and I believe, as we do so, we will find that within both ourselves and our congregation, we will know a sense of peace and calm, and in that circumstance, we will be better able to make the right decisions.

In May, the General Assembly issued a call to the Church to pray, specifically for God to renew us and to pray about the future of the Church. We will be offering prayers Sunday by Sunday but I encourage you at home to also pray for the Church and to pray for me and the Kirk Session that we may be faithful and be able to discern the leading of God's Holy Spirit in these times.

THE BOYS' BRIGADE

Our Juniors in the 8th Stirling Boys' Brigade have been celebrating 100 years of the Junior Section in the Boys' Brigade. Up until 1917 The Boys' Brigade had only catered for boys aged 12 and over. However, in September 1917, Brigade Council (the governing body of The Boys' Brigade) set up the Boy Reserves to cater for boys 9 to 12 years of age.

For several years prior to this a number of Companies had started to take in recruits under twelve. The Boy Scouts had done so too from 1916 as Wolf Cubs, and for this reason there were calls to lower the age limit within the Brigade.

The boys celebrated by having a fun night of games and challenges in the hall, along with a Birthday Cake for the Junior Section! Other activities are planned for the boys to celebrate, including a fun trip to the Megazone Lazer Tag in Falkirk.

BLYTHSWOOD SHOE BOX APPEAL

Once again St Ninians Old Parish Church has decided to support the Shoe Box Appeal.

Last year Blythswood Care delivered more than 120,000 boxes to people in great need in Eastern Europe and Pakistan. Some of these boxes were also distributed to migrants who had gone to Serbia in search of a better life only to discover that many of the inhabitants of Serbia were themselves experiencing great poverty.

In Pakistan where life for many Christian families is a struggle the gift of a shoe box shows that Christians elsewhere are thinking of them.

Receiving a show box filled with simple items that we take for granted can make Christmas really special for someone who is living in dire poverty.

Over the next few Sundays in both vestibules of the Church, there will be leaflets which include a checklist and covered boxes for those who would like to fill a box but not have to cover it. There will also be a large box where single items will be very welcome. These items will then be used to fill shoe boxes. The last date when boxes or items can be donated is Sunday, 12th November.

St Ninians Old has been very generous in its response to this appeal over the years and it is hoped this year's appeal will be met with the same support so that once again we can show the true spirit of Christmas by enabling some of those living in the poorest countries whose need is so great to experience some of the joy of Christmas.

William Simpson and St Ninians

Our William Simpson was the son of Francis Simpson of Plean (1760-1831) and his first wife Jean Sophia Cadell (1785-1806), daughter of William Cadell of Banton, a managing partner in Carron Iron Works. He died at Malta in 1827 aged just 22 years. There are two memorials to him at St Ninians. First, on the inner east wall of the church beside the door, a marble plaque records:

The late
William Simpson Esq.
of Plean
Bequeathed L. 500 Sterling
To the poor of the Parish
of St Ninians

Secondly, the small grassed area enclosed by walls and railings and adjoining the old cemetery has been known as the William Simpson's Asylum Burial Ground at St Ninians Glebe.

In 1829 Francis Simpson informed the four parishes of St Ninians, Falkirk, Larbert and Dunipace that they would each receive £500 in memory of his son. No part of the money could be spent, but it was to be invested and the income applied for the benefit of the poor of the parish. A further condition was that each bequest was to be recorded on a marble slab erected in the church, all four are still extant. I have traced the operations of these bequests through to the early 1900s. In the case of St Ninians, the money (along with other funds) was generally lent out to individuals in the form of bonds for varying amounts on the security of property. There was usually about £20 annually from the Simpson bequest for disbursement at St Ninians: elders received cash to be used in their districts; payments were made to individuals for clothing, coal, rent, food, education and such things. Also, in the 1840s, soup kitchens were supported at St Ninians and Cambusbarron – the 'hungry forties' were not just and Irish problem.

Francis Simpson left money, property and detailed instructions for the establishment at Plean of William Simpson's Asylum, which opened in June 1836. Its inmates were to be men of advanced years and reduced circumstances, preference being given to those who had served in the Navy or Army. Simpson stipulated that, when vacancies arose among his original Trustees, one of these positions should be taken up by the minister of St Ninians and his successors. The Asylum (later, Home) operated much as Francis Simpson had intended until the mid 1990s, by which time it had taken on a more general role in social services.

The Trustees also took on the responsibility to bury deceased inmates. Initially, this was done in Plean Churchyard – indeed the Trustees had been largely responsible for the establishment of Plean Church, which opened in March 1839. By 1927 ground at Plean was exhausted. Several lairs were then purchased at Bannockburn, but in 1932 a little less than half an acre of St Ninians Glebe was purchased by the Trustees from Stirling Presbytery; part of this was used for a burial ground. The Trustees did not provide gravestones – there is however one plaque on the south wall commemorating Benjamin Henry Silk (1875-1961). Nevertheless, thanks to a plan of the ground and burial records, we do know who is buried in this ground and where. There were some 74 burials in 20 lairs along the west and south walls between 1934 and 1974. Burials then reverted to Bannockburn.

- A question was asked about baby food and milk by an adult from the baptismal party who was looking after a small child. This has resulted in my including the above list of Baby Requirements for the first time. Many thanks to the gentleman concerned! It has been an important omission although Start- Up had not requested it as a priority. On raising the subject with them they were more than happy for me to include the above baby items.
- One of the children came up with a most interesting point indeed. After my initial talk, Avril held up various items one by one and asked the children to shout out yes or no whether they would be acceptable to Start-Up. When a tin of corn beef was held up one lad vigorously shouted out NO. Why not he was asked. His reply was most interesting, 'Because I'm a vegetarian,' he replied. Thanks to this most relevant point raised by the youngster leads me on to the subject below which I would never have included but for the 'Corn Beef Question!'

SPECIAL NEEDS, Dietary Requirements and Allergies

When any person or family apply to use a food bank with Start-Up Stirling they fill in a form which covers special needs such as allergies, vegetarian diet, vegan diet, gluten free etc.

As a result their food packages are tailor-made to suit the requirements which are then met in full.

It just goes to show how talking to people about a subject, even to Sunday School children, can bring some new points of interest.


