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#### From the Manse

Dear Friends,

I find it hard to believe that we are at the beginning of a new session in the life of the Church.

It is a time when organisations start up again and activities commence.

I am very grateful to the leaders in all our groups and organisations for their commitment, and I encourage you to remember them and the Church in your prayers.

In June I was discharged as Interim Moderator of



Cowie and Plean Church. The congregation is now linked with Fallin and the Rev Alison Grainger is minister of the linked charge.

I continue to be Interim Moderator of Bannockburn Allan Church which is now in a deferred linkage with Bannockburn Ladywell, and will soon begin the task of finding a minister who will initially be minister of the Allan, and then, following the translation or retirement of the Rev Elizabeth Robertson, will become minister of Ladywell too.

These developments are signs that after a great deal of discussion and planning, the Church is beginning to move forward, but what of St Ninians Old?

For some years we have actively engaged in joint ventures with Park Church and Holy Rude Viewfield, and it is envisaged that in due course we will enter a more formal partnership with these congregations. In its present form, the Presbytery Mission Plan anticipates that the number of full-time ministers within our partnership will go down from three to two.

I believe that working together and combining our resources is the correct thing to do as we endeavour to continue the work of Jesus Christ in an increasingly secular society, but it is also important that we continue to support our own congregation as we seek to serve those who live within our large and diverse parish. This means being faithful in our attendance at worship, in person or online, supporting the work of the Church by regularly reviewing what we give financially, and by giving freely of our time and talents to further the mission of the Church.

Though the challenges confronting us as a Church are considerable, I continue to remain positive, and this is due in no small part to your faithfulness and generosity as a congregation. It is also a consequence of the promise made by Jesus – *"I will be with you always."* This promise has encouraged and strengthened God's people in every generation, and it continues to do so today.

Let us truly believe it and look to the future believing that the best is yet to be! Every blessing,

#### **Services**

Services are held at 10:30am on a Sunday and everyone is welcome. The service is livestreamed and can be watched on the Church YouTube channel.

#### The Rev Hamish Norman McKenzie McIntosh

The Rev Hamish McIntosh died peacefully in the early hours of Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> July. He was one month short of his 102<sup>nd</sup> birthday and was "Father of the Church" being the longest ordained minister in the Church of Scotland at the time of his death.

Hamish was born in Glasgow and studied at the University of Glasgow where he gained an MA. Following his graduation, he went to Trinity College and trained for the ministry. He was ordained on the 16<sup>th</sup> of February 1949 and inducted to his first charge, Craigneuk, in the Presbytery of Hamilton. Five years later he received a call to be minister of Lamlash Church on the Island of Arran.

In 1958 Hamish was inducted to Old Cumnock St Ninian's where experience as a Territorial Army Chaplain led to him becoming a Chaplain in the Royal Air Force in 1961. He served as a Chaplain for over twenty years and he recalled these years with affection and gratitude.

His final charge was Fintry in the Presbytery of Stirling where he served from 1982 until he retired in 1987.

Hamish's retirement was an active one. He served as locum in many congregations and conducted worship regularly until he was in his 80's. Prior to Mr McIntyre's induction in 1998, Hamish conducted the services in St Ninians Old and is remembered with great affection by the congregation.

Hamish was a gifted singer, an avid reader, and one who enjoyed the company of others.

Some years ago, Hamish became a member of St Ninians Old and latterly he worshipped online. Despite his declining physical health, he remained mentally alert and his delightful sense of humour was in evidence until the end.

Hamish's wife, Ena, died in 2012. He is survived by his brother, lain and his family.

A private funeral was held on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> July.

We give thanks to God for Hamish's life and ministry and convey our sympathy to his family and friends.

## The 8<sup>th</sup> Stirling (St Ninians) Company of the Boys' Brigade JACK UNSWORTH





#### **Presbytery of Perth – Presbytery Mission News**



St Matthew's Church in Perth has become the 'home of Presbytery', with our in- person Presbytery meetings being held there. It seems appropriate, therefore, that St Matthew's should share the first of the Mission Committee's 'monthly mission' stories.

St Matthew's is known for opening its doors during weekdays, where volunteers open the doors and visitors can have a cuppa

and a chat. More than that, though, the same visitors can spend time in the sanctuary, either just looking around or having a guided tour. There is a guidebook available, leaflets available about some of the church features in a variety of different languages, and importantly, prayer cards that anyone can take away.

Throughout the summer though, mission at St Matthew's takes on a different feel. There is a Summer Gallery and Festival bringing in thousands of people: visitors, churchgoers, those who've never been in a church, as well as those who say, "I used to come to church, but it's so hard to walk back in the door". The Summer Gallery and Festival makes it easy.

St Matthew's Summer Gallery and Festival is mission with a difference. Throughout July and August, the sanctuary hosts a variety of artwork from local artists, who can sell their work. The artwork changes each Friday after the gallery closes. Saturdays bring a new amazing amount of talent. Doors are open Mon-Sat 10.30-4.00 pm and Sunday 1.00 – 4.00 pm. Entry is free. But it doesn't stop there.



Music for a Wednesday night brings in a different genre of music each week, provided by local musicians. It's a great way to relax midweek and enjoy something different, along with tea and coffee. Music starts at 7.30 pm and lasts for approximately an hour. Of course, the buzz within the chancel continues after that.

The Session Room has been turned into a prayer room, with a variety of ways to encourage visitors to come and have some quiet time and pray as well as to leave prayer

requests. This new development grew out of the pastoral and prayer encounters the volunteers and minister have had with visitors during previous Summer Galleries. People are seeking a place of sanctuary, and they find it at St Matthew's.

Not only does all of this bring people into the church, but it also brings in income. As well as paying a fee to exhibit each week, the artists give the



church a commission on their sales. Entry to the exhibition is free and there is a suggested donation of  $\pm 5$  for the evening music. It's not essential to pay though. All are welcome at St Matthew's.

The Summer Gallery and Festival took vision, teamwork, volunteers and yes, a lot of organisation. So why do it?

There are three reasons why it takes place.

- 1. To bring people into the church, to give them an opportunity to walk back through church doors, or to come in for the first time.
- 2. To work with the community, through sponsorship, local artists and musicians.
- 3. To bring income to the church.

Money usually follows mission, even when it's not requested. It has also given many of the volunteers in the church something to do over the summer. So many church organisations finish for the summer. One gentleman said that when he and his wife were new to the area, they didn't know what to do over the summer as everything they used to do had finished until September. St Matthew's is somewhere they can go.

#### Eric Liddell JIM MACLEOD

At time of writing, the world is gearing up for thirty-third Olympiad; the Olympic Games in Paris, 2024. Those of us of a certain age will be reminded of the wonderful film of 1981, 'Chariots of Fire' which told the story of the eighth Olympiad, the Paris Olympics of 1924; and in particular of the two top British sprinters of the time: England's Harold Abrahams and Scotland's Eric Liddell - now 'rivals under the same flag'. As admirable as Abrahams was and as interesting as his life was, for us Scots, Eric Liddell is the hero of that story and beyond.



Born in Tianjin in China in 1902, to Scottish missionary parents, Eric spent as much time as he could in Edinburgh and studied at the University of Edinburgh. He played rugby as a wing three-quarter for his country before deciding to concentrate on athletics as a sprinter in 100 and 200 metres.

Eric was chosen for the British athletics team for the Olympics, but on discovering that the heats for the 100 metres would be held on a Sunday, he

withdrew from the event and started to train for the 400m event instead. Eric won a bronze medal in the 200m a few days before taking his place for the 400m final. A competitor handed him a message referencing 1 Samuel 2:30 – in the Old Book it says 'He that honours me I will honour'. He won a gold medal that day, possibly spurred on by those words.

On graduating from university, Eric himself became a missionary, still competing when possible. He taught Maths and Science at the Anglo-Chinese college where he promoted Christian values as well as teaching Sunday school and sport. Eric married and had three daughters, but by 1941 life in China had become so dangerous because of aggression from Japan that Eric sent his family to Canada for safety. Eric joined a rural medical mission in Xiaozhang, which was taken over by the Japanese. In 1943 Eric was interned at Weihsien camp, becoming a leader and organiser of people and resources, earning the fond nickname 'Uncle Eric'. He was very well loved and respected, sacrificing all his time and energy for the benefit of the other internees.

Unfortunately, Eric suffered a nervous breakdown, but what nobody realised was he also had a brain tumour. He died on 21st February 1945, only five months before the camp was liberated. His last words were 'It's complete surrender' alluding to his life of service to God. A life very truly well lived.

#### The Gospels ARTHUR S WALLS

#### St. Mathew's Gospel

For The Spring Edition of The Parishioner, my article was about St. Luke's Gospel. My article for The Summer Edition was about Mark's Gospel. My article for The Autumn Edition of The Parishioner is about Matthew's Gospel.

Each of the four Gospels has its own special emphasis. Although Matthew comes first, it is the one that many readers today find most difficult.

But for the first Christians it was most important to show that the new faith was rooted in Judaism, and this is what Matthew, with all its quotations from the Jewish Bible, does. The Gospel is a "bridge", connecting Jesus with what has gone before.

The author, a Jewish Christian writing for a church mainly composed of Jewish Christians, concentrates his skills on presenting Jesus the long-awaited Messiahthe Christ predicted in The Old Testament. He carefully records what Jesus said about his kingdom, a radically different concept from the idea of Messiah current in his day, when most Jews expected a political leader who would free them from Roman domination.

The Gospel does not name its author, but from earliest times it has been attributed to Matthew, the apostle and one-time tax collector for the Romans. Little is known of him and beyond the fact that the Gospel belongs to the period AD50 and AD100 no one knows for certain when or where it was written. Most scholars today believe that Matthew drew on Mark (not vice - versa) and date the Gospel sometime after AD 80.

#### Main themes

(1) The Old Testament points forward to Jesus, in whom all God's purposes are fulfilled.

- (2) Jesus is the Messiah, 'son of God' and 'son of man', God's promised King.
- (3) Jesus both fulfils and transforms the law God gave to Israel through Moses.
- (4) The people of God, now, are those who respond to the message of Jesus.

The Sermon on The Mount is the first and longest of five sections in which Matthew gathers together the teaching of Jesus and includes the Beatitudes for which Matthew is very famous.

Sitting on the hillside with his followers all around him Jesus tells them how his disciples are meant to live.

There is no simple set of rules. Their whole attitude and outlook is to be transformed: from the inside out. Their goal is a goodness like God's, which knows no bounds.

The Beatitudes:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth."

In Luke's version of The Beatitudes, he begins with, "Happy are you who are hungry because you will be fulfilled, Happy are you who weep now because you will laugh."

There are differences between the versions of Matthew and Luke, but one thing is clear- they are a series of bombshells. It may well be that we have read them so often that we have forgotten how revolutionary they are.

Just imagine anyone saying, "Happy are the poor, and woe to the rich!



#### Book Review MARION JACKSON Music in the Dark – Sally Magnusson

Although fiction, this book is based on historical fact and a story from Sally



Magnusson's family history.

It is told at the time of the tragic and brutal Highland Clearances and is set in the area of Croick Parish and Glencalvie, west of Ardgay up Strathcarron around 1842/45 with the eviction of some 90 people from 18 families who had lived there for generations. It tells of their shelter in Croick Kirkyard and even now their desperate messages can be seen scratched on the glass of Croick Church's east window.

It is partly a tender and unusual love story and partly a lament for a people and a way of life brushed aside for profit and attests to a heartfelt faith in the power of poetry and song to

heal wounds and keep memories alive.

The book has been longlisted for the Walter Scott Prize, shortlisted for the Winston Graham Prize and I loved reading it.

# RECIPES



#### Sesame, Date and Ginger Biscuits LORRAINE REID

This is a Dan Lepard recipe cut out from *The Guardian Magazine* in February 2008!

INGREDIENTS 50g dark soft brown sugar 50g treacle 125g unsalted butter, softened 1 egg yolk 175g plain flour



½ tsp bicarbonate of soda
¾ tsp baking powder
2 tsp each ground ginger & mixed spice
175g chopped dates
About 100g sesame seeds

#### METHOD

Put the brown sugar, treacle and butter in a bowl, and beat until creamy. Add the egg yolk, mix until fluffy, then spoon in the flour, bicarb, baking powder and spices, and stir until smooth. Add the dates, beat to combine, then cover and transfer to the fridge for 30 minutes to firm.

Preheat the oven to 180C (160C fan-assisted)/350F/gas mark 4. Divide the mixture into walnut-sized blobs, sprinkle the sesame seeds on to a dinner plate, then flatten the dough balls on it - they should end up less than 1cm thick and 4-5cm wide, coated evenly in seeds. Lay on a parchment-lined tray and bake for 15-20 minutes, until a rich, golden brown and firm at the edges. Remove from the oven, leave to cool on the tray, then store in an airtight tin.

You can exchange the ingredients for any you love more: figs or cranberries for the dates, poppy seeds or oats for the sesame, cinnamon for the ginger. The unbaked mixture keeps well for a week or so, covered, in the fridge, ready to be baked when it suits.
